# New Tenzler Library Exhibit Opens

On August 25th the Lakewood History Museum proudly opened its new Tenzler Library exhibit. The exhibit is a collaboration between the museum, the Pierce County Library System, and museum consultant **Chris Erlich**.

The Library opened in 1963 at the corner of Gravelly Lake Drive and Wildaire Road following a major donation by the Tenzler Foundation. The Foundation was established in the will of well known Philanthropist Flora Belle Tenzler, wife of Herman F. Tenzler, owner of Northwest Door Com-

pany in Tacoma. Flora passed in 1955 and in accordance with her will the Foundation was created with husband Herman serving as Foundation President.

In the early 1960s, the Lakewood area had a small temporary library but rapid growth created a need for a permanent facility. The Tenzler Foundation rose to the occasion and in 1963 donated the funds for a 8,612 square foot library. The library was officially known as the **Flora B. Tenzler**

#### Memorial Library.

Ownership and maintenance of the building belonged to an organization called "FRIENDS of Lakewood Library" while Pierce County Library System provided staff and operations. In the 1970s the Tenzler Foundation made an additional grant to pay for an expansion project that quadrupled the library's size.

In 1982, at the request of the Tenzler Foundation which was terminating its activities, the official name of the Library was

changed to "Lakewood Library" although many residents continued to call it Tenzler.

As time moved forward, the FRIENDS group believed maintenance of the building was becoming increasingly challenging. They decided it would be best to donate the Library to the Pierce County Library System. The donation was completed in 1992 and included \$350,000 cash for needed repairs and renovation. Following transfer, the FRIENDS continued to raise



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# "I Built That Ship Out Of 9,090 Lego Pieces"

Back in early May the Museum hosted a two day Titanic event. A unique and captivating display at the event was a scale model of the Titanic built by Eric Cooper of Steilacoom. Below is Eric's story on how he came to build his model of the legendary Titanic.



"From the moment I laid eyes on the Titanic's design, I was captivated by its history and engineering. I knew I had to build it. It wasn't an easy task. I had to keep track of so many pieces, it felt like I was counting every blade of grass in a field. As I built, I encountered challenges and setbacks, like any sailor navigating a treacherous sea. Whether it was a missing a piece or it was hidden in plain sight. But I pushed through, brick by brick, until the ship was complete. I finished in less than four days and felt like I had just conquered the high seas. The sense of satisfaction and pride I felt was unlike anything I had ever experienced. It was a project that pushed me to my limits, but it was also incredibly rewarding. Looking

back, I'm amazed at what I accomplished. Such a historical ship was now sitting in front of me, crafted with my own two hands. It's a reminder that with hard work and determination, anything is possible."
