


# Coming this summer:





# "RMS Titanic" Coming to Lakewood History Museum, May 10th

110 years ago the majestic passenger ship "Titanic" sank on its maiden voyage from Southhampton, England to New York City after striking an iceberg. 1500 people died in the tragedy including some of the richest in the world when the ship eventually slid 12,000 feet beneath the icy ocean. Today, the "Titanic" still cap-

tures the imagination of the public.

Now you can learn the true story of this epic disaster from Peter Cook, a member of the Titanic Historical Society and the British Titanic Society. Peter's presentation is titled "The Titanic, the Iceberg and the Rest of the Story". Peter's pre-

sentation will also include memorabilia and artifacts raised from the sunken Titanic.

This is a presentation you definitely won't want to miss! Free to the public, but seating is limited and on a first-come basis.

Meet the presenter starts at 6:00 pm. "Titanic" presentation begins at 6:30 pm. Light refreshments will be available.


# Lakewood History Museum and Ivan Visit Federal Way and Steilacoom

The Lakewood History Museum was delighted to receive a speaking invitation by the Federal Way Kiwanis. At their 6 April meeting the museum presented a PowerPoint presentation on the recent relocation and upgrades to the museum plus details on the museum's new Ivan exhibit. 31 members attended the presentation made by Board member Phil Raschke.

A similar presentation was made on 7 April to the Steilacoom Kiwanis which had 35 members in attendance plus seven on Zoom. At the Steilacoom meeting Raschke was joined by Board President Sue Scott and Board members Kris Kauffman and Earl Borgert. Special guest at the meeting was Ron Irwin, former co-owner of Ivan and the Lakewood B & I store.

of Colonial Plaza will soon be joined by another distinguishing feature: a new piece of public art will be installed. Metallic "Gateway Arcs" will welcome from afar and amaze from up close with a collection of community voices.

Two sweeping steel arcs designed by artist **John Fleming** will be positioned along the Gravelly Lake Drive entrance to Motor Avenue, beckoning visitors to one of Lakewood's community gathering places.

Made from inch-thick curved steel plates, the arcs will form a gateway: the larger will stretch 50 feet wide and the smaller 34 feet. Both will rise about 4 feet from the ground.

One hundred and twelve aluminum "story strips" will be installed within the arc, each etched with quotes and memories gathered from the community. The City will gather phrases, quotes, and stories about life in Lakewood to include in the piece.

From the park side, visitors can enjoy these stories and memories from up close. From the street, the aluminum strips will reflect a luminous glow through triangular cutouts.

# New Book, "Buffalo Soldiers and Band Music"

The Tacoma Buffalo Soldiers Museum and the Lakewood History Museum are delighted to announce the release of the new book "Buffalo Soldiers and Band Music" written by Susan Hintz of Lolo, Montana.

The book is a detailed history of the 25th Infantry Band at Fort Missoula, Montana from 1888 to 1898. During this period the 25th Infantry was one of four all-black regiments serving mainly on the rapidly developing western frontier. Black soldiers were relatively new to the west and were met with the same discrimination as their counter-


parts in the more populated north and south.

Quality entertainment, however, was also in short supply in the small towns and trail camps dotting the west. But each Buffalo Soldier regiment had its own band and these bands reached out to the local communities for parades, con-certs and other performances. Besides peacekeeping, this out-reach created a wealth of good will and respect. But who were these band members and what were their lives actually like during their service?

Author Susan Hintz has researched the lives of the members of the 25th Regimental Band and her book is filled with biographies, genealogical research and daily reports that give you a glimpse of these men, before, during and after their time in the 25th Infantry Band.



For example, Hintz notes that while at Fort Missoula, band member **Travis Bridges** participated in the famous "Army Bicycle Corps"



test of June,1897. The test was to determine if combat-loaded soldiers could be moved by newly developed Spaulding bicycles faster than by horse.

Bridges plus 19 other selected soldiers joined **Lieutenant James A. Moss** on a 40 day, 1,900 mile ride from Fort Missoula, Montana to St. Louis, Missouri.

The test proved that bikes required less care and were twice as fast as horse cavalry. This coming June will mark the 125th Anniversary of this

historic ride. However, the advent of the automobile soon overtook the Army's interest in the bicycle.

Hintz's fascinating book is now available for sale at both the Tacoma Buffalo Soldiers Museum, 1940 S Wilkeson St. (253-272-4257) open Wednesday and Saturday from 11 am to 3 pm and the Lakewood History Museum located at 6114 Motor Ave SW (253-682-3480) open Friday and Saturday from noon to 4 pm.

Price for the book is \$20 with proceeds being donated to the museum. Both museums have 24/7 answering machines. Each copy is personally autographed by the author.

Emigrating from the Orkney Islands to present day Lakewood in the 1840's, the **Flett family** settled by a creek—one that bears their name to this day.

Though successful farmers, the Fletts didn't discover their true calling until their ever-growing herd of dairy cows started producing more milk than the family could consume. Sharing the surplus with friends and neighbors resulted in so much demand that Annie Flett's husband, George Chapman figured he'd better apply for a dairy license—which he received in June. 1903.

For the next 91 years, **Flett Dairy** supplied milk, buttermilk, cottage cheese and ice cream to stores throughout western Washington. Growth in both population and development finally made so vast a bucolic enterprise untenable and the dairy closed its doors in 1994.




The Flett House in the early 1900's.

# ON THIS SITE STOOD **BRADLEY BLOCKHOUSE** & FLETT HOUSE

The Bradley Blockhouse stood at this site in the 1840's. It began as a log barn, but during the Indian Wars of 1855 & 1856, it was used as a blockhouse for the protection of the settlers in the area. In 1889, the Flett Family house built over the site of the old barn. In the 1950's, the house was moved about 300 feet north to another lot in order to make room for a gas station.
