


Bestselling Author Dennis Bauer Visits Lakewood History Museum

On July 13th, the museum was honored to host bestselling author Dennis Bauer. Dennis's appearance was sponsored by the Pierce County Library Association and his topic was "How to Write Your Bestselling Nonfiction Book". His outstanding presentation was based on his bestselling book "Flight Plan: Peak Performance in Turbulent Times".



For example, when you plan a flight you break it down into time segments. In writing you do the same.

First decide how many pages the book is going to be. For 200 pages figure one page an hour for two hours per day

and your ETA (Estimated Time of Arrival) is about 100 days or a mere three months from takeoff to book completion.

Museum Outreach Program Still Reaching Out


